The Optimist Club of Las Cruces presented a check to Jennica Bustamante from My Friend's Place at



FYI, which is the emergency shelter for teenagers. They are currently waiting to have their kitchen licensed, so they're not operational just yet, but VERY shortly and appreciate the donations.

The Club's guest was Andres Armijo, the principal at Crossroads Middle and High School, which is a program for students who have been longterm suspended from schools across the district for drugs weapons, gang and fighting. All the students have experienced trauma. The program addresses mental health issues. The workers are very special to take on these kids and the school has a full-time psychologist and they spend 50% of their day on mental health issues and 50% on school work. Armijo says it's very rewarding to work with these kids. Restorative practices is the fancy name for building relationships and fixing existing ones, just paying attention to the kids and digging down to the root cause of the problems the kids are experiencing. The school district had nine pilot schools in the

beginning, schools with non-stop discipline issues. Sonoma was an example he cited, which had over 950 office referrals in a semester. They did a big professional development drive, working with the teachers and the students and they are down to two referrals per semester. WOW! He currently has four coordinators working with every school in the district, where they must apply different approaches with every situation, because it's not a one size fits all solution situation. The teachers, principals, parents, community stakeholders and counselors work together to solve behavioral issues for collaborative solutions. It takes more time, but solving the problems is more helpful than applying a panacea. They are funded through the district but because they are a program, it's not the same sort of funding as for a school. He says a lot of the success because the Las Cruces Public Schools administration strongly supports this program. They do have regular math, science, English and social studies as well as online course. PE online? Well, it exists.

Reintegration of the students is the goal and they currently have an 87% reintegration rate. They have STRONG support from the parents.
